## Henry Johnson Dinner 2017 "That was then, this is now"

Under the steer of Chairman Pip Penney the Henry Johnson Dinner was full of vim and vigour. There was a buzz to the evening which was respectful of history and tradition yet asked ringers to think about the modern day place of ringing. Excellence and achievements were celebrated whilst focusing on effective frameworks for the raising of new ringers. The food was good too!



The fifth item of the evening's programme, simply billed as 'Handbell Ringing' epitomised the why and wherefore of the evening. The performance of Little Surprise Royal, echoed points of some key toasts in that it was traditional, had cultural memory, saw communing of like minded people and demonstrated excellence. We could hear a purity in the rhythmic, graduation of small changes and performed as it was, it had an almost celestial quality.

In his toast to 'The Church' Simon Linford reflected on tradition and habit and the push and pull of the ringers relationship with church, architecture and the pub and asked the question; Does our ringing still call people to worship? In 'The Response' Father Barrie Scott noted that times are changing, not only in the demise of evensong but in such things as the closure of the Whitechapel Bell Foundry, however he also demonstrated that we have collective cultural memory and a shared history. The sound of church bells, whilst not a memorable theme tune, do seem to remain part of our communities and are still noticed.

The speeches of the evening provided an effective dialogue. Alistair Cherry proposed the toast to 'Guests and Visitors' which deftly highlighted the long reach of the Guild. The relationships of members with ringers throughout the country and further, continues to provide an extraordinary network.



In his response and in moving the toast to the 'Continued Prosperity of the St Martin's Guild', Dickon Love provided a mock tirade of all that London ringing has to offer, as a foil to celebrate Birmingham's sociability, standards, recruitment of ringers and the provision of the best opportunities and teaching.

And it is the opportunities, teaching, support and development which was the nucleus of Stephanie Warboys' toast to the 'Health of the Chairman'. In reviewing the work and contribution to ringing of the 2017 Chair Pip Penney, the list was astounding, and the drive was clear, an effective way of learning to ring. Pip's prodigious output and 'storm Doris' levels of energy, not only inspired but enabled others through the teaching and learning frameworks: breaking it all down,

writing it all up, training the trainers, connecting those that can do and are willing to do, recruiting and then retaining learners who go on to achieve recognised levels of proficiency.



Stephanie emphasised a step change under the heading 'That was then and this is now', commending the increasingly positive environment nurtured by the current Guild Standing Committee, while recognising both the diamond work of John Anderson over 60 years and the work of Tony Daw as previous ringing master. Reclaiming the 12 bell title at the Aston competition final was a coup de grâce, but this was balanced with success

and pride in the Birmingham School of Bell Ringing and student ringers achieving Level 5 under Learning the Ropes. There was a renewed view of what Birmingham ringing is about, as epitomised by the Excellence in Innovation, Retention and Achievement ART award won by Clare McArdle.



In ending the speeches Pip Penney drew a colourful and oddly memorable picture of sheep sliding on ice, amusingly illustrating the precarious nature of deploying information, data and trends in relation to ringing. So to the present, looking out across the banquet tables and the rarity of

seeing ringers in their banquet finery, the 'now' included the statesmen that is Don Finnemore, a table of young bloods, honored guests who are stalwarts of ringing development, ministers of the

church, old friends, the movers and shakers, the backbone of the Guild and guite a few learners.

Not a bad 'now' to be stepping on with.

## **CASTLE BROMWICH**

The first stage of the restoration of Castle Bromwich bells (i.e. the dismantling) is complete. Before the bells fell silent, we were pleased to have two successful quarters rung by a band of local captains and former captains and by our tower band. We also welcomed a number of former ringers and others from local towers who came for a final grab.



rior to the arrival of the bellhanger, a number of the ringers loosened and unbolted anything they could with the kind support of Simon Adams, always a good friend of our tower. Then, over eight days at the beginning of March, Taylor's bellhanger Andy Ogden removed the bells, the frame and belfry floor. Our steeplekeeper, Stuart Stanton had been able to recruit a dozen volunteers: some were ringers from across the Guild, others were interested locals. It was dirty and physically demanding work, but some enjoyed the challenge so much that they ignored the rota and turned up most days. We really are indebted to them for their remarkable efforts, not only for the substantial savings made on the bill, but also for the enthusiasm and commitment they showed to our project.

Those who have rung at Castle Bromwich know what a quirky ring it was. On dismantling the frame, it turned out that this was not just because the bells were poorly balanced. Charles Carr's 1893 frame

was bolted to the floor in only three places, while the beams supporting the belfry floor were not fixed to the tower wall, but merely resting on a brick ledge.

Our six Gillett & Johnston bells are now at Loughborough awaiting a wash and brush-up and will



have their tuning checked in due course. Our two new trebles were cast in September last year. Work on the new installation is due to commence at the end of July and is expected to take up to five weeks. Stuart will again be in recruiting mode.



The Castle Bromwich ringers would like to thank their bellhanger, the extraordinary Andy Ogden, untiring, totally committed and very good to work with, and also St Paul's in the Jewellery Quarter for allowing the Castle Bromwich band to use their tower while theirs is out of action.

Of the five teams competing here, Birmingham emerged as clear winners with St Paul's Cathedral and Melbourne coming joint second. These three teams go on to the final at Southwark Cathedral in June.

To be a good ringer, you need to be prepared to work in a team, to practise and make a firm commitment to ringing at your local church on Sunday after you've been taught (there's no requirement to attend church services). Bell ringers are often hidden away upstains, or you will need to be willing to climb the opinal staircase up the tower to the ringing room.





#### ART AGM

On 11th March just over 100 ringers arrived at the Village Hall in Old Basing. The event was the ART annual AGM, Conference and Awards ceremony hosted by the Winchester and Portsmouth Guild. It was also the fifth anniversary of the Association.



I arrived after the AGM just in time for coffee. The large hall was full of people talking. A dumbbell was set up in one corner connected to a simulator and tables had displays of publications, DVDs etc. available to buy then and there or online. After introductions and a welcome from Graham Nabb the conference began.

The first talk, Engaging Your Stakeholders, was given by Mark Regan and emphasised the need to adapt, adjust and think differently in order to engage the non-ringing community. Graham Nabb was next showcasing new products from ART. These included:

- Raising and Lowering in Peal DVD
- 50 New Things booklet-a bucket list for new and not so new ringers to tick off
- The new, improved ART web-site
- Tower Talk an online magazine for learners

Pip Penney spoke with enthusiasm about the resources available to enable teachers and other interested ringers in running workshops ranging from hand bells to simulators.

The third presentation of the morning was given by Moira Johnson on the subject of Recruitment: the Holy Grail.

For the afternoon session we split into smaller groups to hear talks that we had chosen when booking. My choices were:

Elva's talk gave an insight into the psychology of group behaviour and how groups behave in response to change. There were many interesting charts in her presentation. Try googling some of these:

2. Igniting the Spark: Lessons from Devon - Leslie Boyce

This presentation showed how collaboration with a primary school has brought new, young ringers to the point that they are part of their local band. Even though my stomach wasn't rumbling, the tea and cakes at 4 o'clock were very welcome. Thanks and congratulations to the cake-bakers.

After tea Philip Barnes presented a report from CRAG(Council Review Action Group). This group was formed to review the role and activities of Central Council. The final session was led by Graham Nabb inviting questions from the floor.

Now it was time for the ART Awards Ceremony. The hall was cleared. Tables were placed down the length of the room and drinks and nibbles (is a sausage roll a nibble?) appeared sponsored by John Taylor & Co. Stephanie Warboys and Stephanie Pattenden were in charge. St. Martin's Guild did well.

Last year Clare McArdle and the Birmingham School of Bell Ringing won the ART Award for Innovation in Recruitment or Retention so this year she had the pleasure of presenting the award to Arnold, St. Mary's, Nottingham.

# 10 Bell Quarter Peal Programme

This year the plan is to have just one 10/12 bell event per month. As well as having fewer events I feel there's more of a need for targeted



practice sessions, (workshops almost), as opposed to arranging quarters. It's worth remembering that scoring a quarter was never the main goal, it has always been to provide ringers coming into higher numbers ringing with the opportunity for some extended practice with a half decent band around them. Scoring a quarter, if indeed we did, was just a bonus.

This year started out with a Cambridge Royal practice at Moseley in January and two ringers successfully honing their skills in this department. By chance an extra event was arranged at St. Martin's a week later where a good quarter of Grandsire Caters was scored, a first on 10 for Susannah Moore.

The February event was to be Cambridge Maximus but sadly after 40 minutes of perfectly respectable ringing a few too many ringers decided to go AWOL all at the same time! Still good practice though for some of the band, and I include me in that list.

March has also seen two events, (despite my comments at the start of this article), a quarter at St. Paul's of Cambridge Royal which turned into a Little Bob Royal practice, (nothing wrong in that and again, some good 10 bell experience gained), and also a re-run of the Cambridge Maximus which very nearly suffered the same fate as the previous attempt. A great quarter though which was a first of Treble Bob Maximus for Angie, and a first of Surprise Maximus for the programme.

Can I once again thank everyone who so willingly, and sometimes at very short notice, gives up their valuable time to support these events. I really appreciate everything you do as I'm sure those benefitting from the programme do too. And finally, if there are any of you out there, or you know of someone, who would benefit from taking their first steps in 10 bell ringing, then please do get in touch. Ringing the treble to Plain Bob or Grandsire Caters is where it all starts.
