The Adult Leaners Event in early April saw a coach load of 30 members do a tour of the Black Country, taking in the towers of Sedgley, Dudley and Netherton, as well as two famous pubs – the Beacon Hotel in Sedgley and Ma Pardoes in Netherton. A number of the helpers who have been on previous events noted quite how much the standard of ringing had improved, with the School having had a notable effect on quite a number of participants. This format is clearly a success and its frequency will be increased.

The Monday night peal band at Birmingham Cathedral became the third band to ring the "Particles" peal devised by David Pipe which is a quantum leap in how peals of Spliced are rung. The composition is not rung by the ringers knowing the lines but by knowing the structure of a 10 methods and 'Blocks', an innovation that caused the Central Council to have to change its rules on how a Method is defined. The following page is all the band would have in order to ring the Blocks. The peal shot to the top of the "Featured Performances" on BellBoard.



The May meeting and 6 bell Contest were hosted by Northfield. Five bands entered the contest, with the change ringing section being won by Harborne (Geriatrics) and the call changes being won by Northfield. Harborne (Youths) acquitted themselves well, as did three ringers from the School who rang in a Handsworth team and got their first experience of ringing under pressure, and ringing for 240 changes! Phil Ramsbottom from St Martin's was Chief Judge, and gave helpful and constructive comments, including alternative "Sunday Service" scores, as marks out of ten for overall performance.

At Castle Bromwich, the Heritage Lottery Fund application for help towards the £80,000 cost of rehanging and augmentation has been submitted. A year into the project and the trustees of the project continue their concerted effort to encourage visitors to the tower, with the aim of raising the awareness of local people to the plight of the bells in the hope that they might financially support the restoration project. The ringers piggy backed on the Castle Bromwich Heritage Weekend to show lots of people up the tower. Sadly a peal arranged for the Saturday morning came to grief from mechanical failure after an hour and a half of good ringing, and while the band drowned their sorrows in the beer tent, the local ringers took comfort from the fact that this further emphasizing the need for work on the bells!

While the bellringers have shown visitors up the tower over many years, it is reckoned that since the Garden Fete of 2013 over 500 people have

climbed the 99 steps to the top of the tower - and most have had a go at ringing the bells. This probably makes Caste Bromwich tower the most visited in the diocese (unless you know otherwise!).

Since ITV Central news reporter Victoria
Davies came up to the ringing chamber at last
year's Fete, the church tower has welcomed
visitors on a number of open days and the
ringers have arranged visits for half a dozen
groups from local uniformed organisations,
beavers, cubs, brownies, etc. And there are
three more groups already booked to visit in
September.

The Surprise Minor evenings held on consecutive evenings in June, gave 12 members the opportunity to learn techniques for multi spliced Surprise Minor by ringing different methods above and below the treble. For many more used to helping others than pushing themselves, this was a serious use of grey matter, as the water got deeper and deeper, and the shallow waters of Cambridge Minor got further and further away. Simon Linford ran the sessions, ably assisted by Mark Eccleston and John Warboys. The 'students' (all experienced ringers by any definition) came along knowing four core methods, and finished having rung 19, mostly in spliced up to six at a time.

Rose Horton has decided that she wants to appear on the list of people ringing 50 or more QPs in a year that is published in the RW. However, she didn't decide she wanted to do this until the beginning of May at which time she had notched up 4 QPs for the year. There is a QP attempt every Sunday at Harborne so Rose made sure that Tracy was aware that she wanted to ring in every attempt from May onwards. On assessing the likelihood of achieving her target, Rose then realised, there was the small problem of her leaving for

University in September, with no idea of the "quarter pealability" of her prospective new surroundings. It was time to take matters into her own hands. She scouted round the most likely members of the Harborne band for volunteers and set 2 dates for "Rose's Quarter" Peal Days" and the first one took place on Monday 30th June. A series of emails from Rose told us we needed to be at Edgbaston for a 9.00 am start and we would ring 3 quarter peals at 50 minute intervals. After suitable refreshments in The Bell, we were to ring a further 4 quarter peals at Harborne. We rang a total of 7 quarter peals, all different: Plain Bob Minor, Cambridge Minor, Stedman Doubles, Plain Bob Doubles, St Clements College Bob Minor, Mixed Doubles (3 methods) and Grandsire Doubles. There were a total of 10 different ringers involved and 4 different conductors including Rose. Congratulations to Rose for proving such an able organiser. No detail was left to chance and for those of us used to organising bands and ringing events it was fantastic to be able to just be "one of the participants". Rose should be justifiably proud of this considerable achievement.

There is still a way to go for Rose to achieve her target of 50 quarter peals this year, so a further 2 "Rose's Quarter Peal Days" are in the pipeline. Watch this space....



The National 12 Bell Striking Contest was won by Birmingham for an unprecedented 5th time in succession at Oxford on 28th June.


Ringing Stedman Cinques, the band, which has only seen one change of personnel in that time (Susan Healy coming in to replace Gill Fielden this year), the band scored 87%, with the 2nd place team on 81% and the rest somewhat less. Over 700 people attended the Final, which has now become a major ringing occasion. The Birmingham band is always encouraged by the amount of friendly support that comes from members of the Guild, which is needed to offset those who think it must be someone else's turn to win!

SS Peter & Paul, Aston will be host for the **2016 Final**. The church had originally asked about hosting the Final in 2020 to mark the 900th Anniversary of the first stone building on the site of the current church, however after contacting the 12 bell committee it was discovered that a venue for the 2016 Final was a cause of concern. The church is also planning to mark the 100th Anniversary of the Battle of the Somme around the first weekend

of July 2016, so after some quick discussion with Guild officers it was decide to step into the breach and provide a venue for the 2016 Final. Hosting the 12 Bell Final is a very large undertaking now, with the bar being raised higher and higher as more and more people attend, however the Guild will of course pull out all the stops.
